Speaking about QMs: we have just received delivery of the second container to store all our equipment in – it is quite a neat little compound just behind the former "crew hut" at Frylands as you can see from the images below. Thanks to Olly Campbell, Julie Cook, Jo Loft, Alison Newall, Di Phillips, Andy Preston, Niels Rump, Claire Weedon, Helen Wise as well as Barry Goswell from Frylands for the help on the day. We still need to move some equipment from the trailer we were loaned by Frylands as temporary storage to the new container – something that we will ask the Scouts and Explorers to help with over the next few meetings.



We hope that these two containers will service us well for years to come. This, finally, concludes our move away from the Methodist Church in Hawes Lane; hooray!



We have just had the opportunity to obtain a few children's kayaks. These boats are in addition to the stand-up paddleboards we already own. This will allow us to offer an even wider water sports programme to your children (and, yes, there is room to store the kayaks between our two containers). However, this comes with a caveat: We currently only have three leaders that are trained and permitted to take Squirrels, Beavers, Cubs, Scouts and/or Explorers out on the water – the Scout Association has, quite correctly, a fairly stringent licensing regime for such activities to ensure all children (and leaders) are safe – and we could really use some additional help. So: if water sport is your thing, please do let one of the leaders know; any necessary training will be provided. And, speaking from personal experience, you will not regret it!

I also have two dates for your calendar: The first is the weekend of the 1st to 4th May



2026 where the group will celebrate its 80th birthday (we were founded as the 46th Beckenham with the "46" signifying the year it all started for us) with a group camp at Bears Woods. All members of all Sections are invited. I am sure the programme for those three days will be as fabulous as the time we all spent together at last year's group camp.

But before that we will be having our AGM as part of a "picnic in the park" after the summer holidays. All members, their parents, carers and siblings are invited to come, sit, eat, chat

and a play a game or two together. A formal invitation will be circulated once we have set a date and a location.
